Food Systems Summit 2024 – pan-India knowledge exchange platform for food system stakeholders - commences today

New Delhi, 15th October, 2024: The first edition of 'Food Systems Summit 2024: Marketplace of Ideas' in collaboration with Bharat Krishak Samaj (BKS) was inaugurated today. Eminent speakers included T Nanda Kumar, IAS (Retd), Former Secretary, Ministry of Agriculture and Farmers Welfare and S. Vijay Kumar, IAS (Retd), Lead, FOLU India & Distinguished Fellow, TERI, Morgan Gillespy, Executive Director, FOLU and Ajay Vir Jakhar, Chairman, BKS.

Over three days, FSS 2024 will witness 200 participants, drawn from diverse fields related to the food system, including from 50+ CSOs. The expected audience includes the presenting institutional representatives, policymakers, individual experts, civil society, students, and academia. Across 24 sessions, speakers will showcase sustainable models in the following four key thematic areas:

- Supporting sustainable agriculture production
- Facilitating rainfed area management
- Improving nutritional outcomes
- Driving sustainable food distribution systems and consumption behaviour

Setting the context to the Summit, **S. Vijay Kumar** said: "Our priority is to convene various stakeholders associated with the agri value chain and leverage that collective wisdom to enable accelerated transition to sustainable food and land-use systems. The Summit is a further step in that direction, as a unique national platform to provide much-needed space to CSOs to interact and showcase their efforts. The learnings of FSS will help in framing our next initiative - to be called '**The Food Systems Hub**'."

Sharing a global perspective on food systems, Morgan Gillespy opined: "Food systems transformation is about more than agricultural productivity—it's about creating systems that work for everyone. FOLU India is uniquely positioned to lead by aligning with national priorities, engaging stakeholders, and fostering partnerships for sustainable, inclusive change."

T Nanda Kumar while providing an overview remarked: "This Summit is about bringing voices from the ground to a common platform and see how they can be presented in the policy space. This kind of interactivity is not often witnessed in the food systems sector. We are trying to get together people with interesting work from all spaces and explore how this mosaic can emerge into a pattern where we can find instances for replicating or scaling up viable solutions."

Ajay Vir Jakhar in his closing remarks said, "For a successful food systems transformation it's critical to build trust amongst stakeholders and there's a tendency to underestimate the time it takes to 'build trust'. Markets don't always work. That's why the government has to intervene. We need leadership to protect the interests of their citizens, not just the consumers. Making one thing will tend to make another thing worse. Leadership is a matter of choosing which problems to have, & that is where a systems approach becomes critical."

The Hub will provide organised knowledge and enable experience-sharing and help build capacity within the civil society towards the intended systemic transformation.

Programme schedule: FSS 2024 will have several key speakers across six plenary sessions to follow. These include representatives from the government, philanthropies, civil society and multi-lateral and bi-lateral agencies. Access the full list here.
